



Message Notes:

Title: Is Jesus Really God's Son?

Scripture: Matthew 3:13-17; John 1:29-36; Isaiah 42:1

For those going deeper:

This week's memory verse

1 Peter 3:15 (HCSB) but honor the Messiah as Lord in your hearts. Always be ready to give a defense to anyone who asks you for a reason for the hope that is in you.

Monday

Subject: The Difficulty of Accepting Grace

Scripture: Acts 3:18-21

Commentary:

Grace is defined as God's unmerited favor or God giving us what we don't deserve. This is a wonderful and amazing gift that God gives freely to those who repent and turn to Christ in faith, but this Amazing Grace is still difficult for two different kinds of people. First, those people that are awash with guilt. The thought is that God is so mad at me that there is no way that He would accept me. When God's grace is presented to them, they feel too unworthy to accept it. However, there is a second class of people that find it difficult to accept God's grace and this group may indeed be under the most sinister of Satan's illusions. These are the self-righteous people who do volunteer work, who have never been in trouble with the law, who pay their bills and the like. These hardworking folks are basically honest can very quickly spot a dozen people that are worse off than they are. The idea that they cannot contribute to their own redemption is an insult to their sense of accomplishment and, thus, God's grace is seen as utterly offensive. You've probably heard the saying "God helps those who help themselves". It is so unfortunate that so many have come to believe this, when in reality God really only helps those who cannot possibly help themselves. This is when God really shows up, when we finally come to the end of our futile attempts to help ourselves.

Questions for further thought:

- 1. How difficult is it for me to accept God's amazing grace?
- 2. Are there any people in my life that I have a hard time seeing as being forgiven? Why?

Challenge:

Look for opportunities to seek out a person in which you may have had differences of opinions in the past. Seek to practice grace by opening the lines of communication and to begin the healing process.

Tuesday

Subject: A Watered-Down Gospel

Scripture: 2 Timothy 2:1-3

Commentary:

Without question the greatest life to live is the Christian life, because God takes a life that was empty, aimless, and worst of all, headed for certain judgment and turns it around and transforms it. He forgives all our sin, removes our quilt, and literally takes residence inside us through His Holy Spirit. This all is a result of the power of the gospel proclaimed and believed. However, some have been lulled to sleep by a watered-down version of the gospel; a gospel that promises forgiveness but rarely mentions the need to repent (turn) from your sin. A gospel that promises peace but never warns of persecution. A gospel that says God wants you to be healthy and wealthy and never have problems of any consequence. A gospel that says you will so find the favor of God that a parking space will always be available for you. I know this sounds silly, but that is the lure of some of today's pep talk preaching. But this is the gospel of the Bible. The Christian life is not a playground, but a battleground. Not only is there a God who loves you enough to offer a provision for sin's forgiveness, but this is the same God who also wants to change you and use you for His Kingdom work now.

Questions for further thought:

- 1. Do I fully understand the level of spiritual battle that is raging all around me?
- 2. Do I love and praise God as much during times of trial as during times of blessing? Why or why not?

Challenge:

Be actively seeking individuals with which you could share your faith. Be ready as God provides those opportunities.

Wednesday

Subject: Gratitude First?

Scripture: Luke 17:12-18

Commentary:

Perhaps one of the most graphic illustrations of ingratitude in the Bible is Jesus' healing of the ten lepers in Luke 17. The lepers stood at a distance and garnered Jesus' attention as they called out in loud voices saying "Jesus, Master have mercy on us". Leprosy was a skin disease that caused a person to be deemed ceremonially defiled (symbolic of sin) and they were forced to live outside the village, separated from those that were deemed clean. Jesus initiated their healing, sending them to the priests where their miraculous healing could be publically certified. You would expect to see a rousing display of profound gratitude from the healed lepers. And yet gratitude escaped the attention for most (nine to be exact) of the aforementioned healed. Now some were probably excited to tell their families and some were probably in a state of shock. Some may have gone looking for Jesus sometime later, but were unable to find him. It turns out, ingratitude is not always calloused or premeditated. Sometimes it is just fourth, fifth, or tenth on a list we really never get around to following through on. However, for one of the healed lepers gratitude was his first, immediate reaction to grace. Before doing all the other trivial things, he returned to say thank you to his Rescuer. Before anything else, "Thank You, Lord!"

Questions for further thought:

- 1. How often do I only think my gratitude and never express it? Why would that be?
- 2. It is easy to feel gratitude yet never express it. Do I believe that this is not a big deal and how could the atmosphere been different with a display of thankfulness?

Challenge:

Meditate on God's word and think back on times in your life when an expression of gratitude may have not been your first response. Try to make thankfulness a priority going forward.

Thursday

Subject: A Faith Worth Emulating

Scripture: Hebrews 11:1-3

Commentary:

Faith is defined as sure of what we hope for and certain of what we do not see. (Hebrews 11:1 NIV) These two words, sure and certain, are paramount in this definition. They describe a secure beginning and ending point. The beginning of faith is believing in God's character – He is who He says. The end point is believing in God's promises - He will do what He says. We demonstrate true faith when we believe that God will fulfill His promises even though we don't see any way or evidence for those promises materializing yet. Faith is easy when things are going well, but how quickly can that faith disappear when life gets hard and the chips are down. In John 4, we find an amazing example of a man of faith. John tells of a Roman military official whose son was very sick, likely at the point of death. This situation was so grave that he was begging Jesus for a miracle and Jesus did not disappoint. In fact, his words to the Roman were rather shocking, "Go, your son will live." John says "The man believed Jesus and went on his way" He left and walked home believing his son will be healed. What faith this man had, but that is not all. Here is the key. He trusted Jesus at His word and he acted on it. Many of us would be tempted to want proof from Jesus or want him to accompany us back to our house. But not this Roman, for Jesus' word was enough for him as he had assurance of things hoped for and certainty of things not seen. Now, that is a faith to emulate.

Questions for further thought:

- 1. How would others describe my faith?
- 2. Do I trust in the promises God makes or do I trust in my emotions?

Challenge:

Pray for God's will to be done in your life as you seek opportunities for Him to strengthen your faith in assurance and conviction in the person and word of Jesus.

Friday

Subject: Self Righteousness

Scripture: Luke 11:37-52

Commentary:

In this passage, Jesus is speaking with the Pharisees and criticizing their blatant self-righteous practices. These "experts of the law" were very adept at making themselves appear religious on the outside while having less than honorable intentions in their temple dealings. It brings to mind a story from Luke 18 when Jesus told about the two men that went to the temple to pray. One was a Pharisee and the other was a tax collector. The Pharisee, knowing all the laws of God, stood up and prayed about himself, saying "Thank you, God that I am not like other men, or even like that tax collector. "He went on to recite his laundry list of good deeds that he had accomplished including fasting and tithing of all that he gets. The tax collector, on the other hand, was considered to be the worst of the worst. A lot of them were considered thieves and even the New Testament gives them a category all their own. There were sinners and "tax collectors." One of the biggest impediments to spiritual growth is a lack of true repentance. The Pharisee modeled this very eloquently as he smugly ran down his checklist before God expecting some kind of door prize for his effort. However, the tax collector saw himself as he truly was. A sinner quilty of every kind of depravity needing a gracious savior for forgiveness of sin saying "God, be merciful to me, a sinner." Which of these men went home justified? Jesus says, "The tax collector went home justified. For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, but the one who humbles himself will be exalted."

Questions for further thought:

- 1. Have I ever made a kind of mental checklist with God such as I've prayed today, I've read my Bible today, etc.? Did God take notice? Was He pleased?
- 2. OR do I say Thank you Lord for enabling me to do these things and please continue your good work in me? How is this different?

Challenge:

Pray and meditate on this passage and ask God for humbleness of spirit as you seek His will for your life.
